ABOUT THIS GUIDE

This guide provides all information required to install, set up, and administer PDF Converter version 10gR3 on a computer running either Microsoft Windows or UNIX.

CONVENTIONS

The following conventions are used throughout this guide:

- Forward slashes (/) are used to separate parts of an Internet address. For example, http://www.google.com/maps. A forward slash might or might not appear at the end of an Internet address.
- ❖ Backward slashes (\) are used to separate the levels in a path to a Windows server, directory, or file. For example, C:\ibr\refinery\. A backward slash will always appear after the end of a Windows server, directory, or file path.
- ❖ Forward slashes (/) are also used to separate the levels in a path to a UNIX server, directory, or file. For example, /usr/ibr/refinery.
- ❖ File names and file paths within text are indicated by the following convention: <*filename*> file in the <*path to directory*> directory.
- ❖ The notation < refinery_install_dir > is used to refer to the location of the main Inbound Refinery installation directory.
- ❖ The notation < content_server_install_dir > is used to refer to the location of the main Content Server installation directory.

PRODUCT ENHANCEMENTS

The following product enhancements have been made for PDF Converter version 10gR3:

❖ PDF Converter Offered for Use with Choice of Distillers

PDF Converter is no longer distributed with a PostScript or optimization distiller engine. This allows for manual configuration with a variety of distiller engines, which you must obtain or purchase from the corresponding third-party software manufacturer. PDF Converter Basic is no longer offered.

❖ PDF Converter now Inbound Refinery Component

Inbound Refinery has been redeveloped for version 10gR3. Inbound Refinery has the same basic functionality as in previous releases, however it is now based on Content Server. Amongst many other advantages, this enables the use of components for easier, faster patching and the development of conversion add-ons. PDF Converter has been redeveloped as component for Inbound Refinery.

❖ New Administration Interface

PDF Converter has a new, web-based administration interface. The new interface leverages all Content Server interface features.

❖ New Version of Outside In X

PDF Converter includes Outside In X 8.1.9, which can be used for PDF creation on Windows.

ABOUT PDF CONVERTER

PDF Converter is a conversion add-on that is available for use with Inbound Refinery. PDF Converter converts files to PDF (Portable Document Format), enabling users to view the files through standard web browsers with a PDF reader plugin (such as Adobe Acrobat Reader). There are three options for converting files to PDF:

❖ Convert to PDF using third-party applications—When running on Windows, PDF Converter can use several third-party applications to create PDF files of content items. In most cases, a third-party application that can open and print the file is used to print the file to PostScript, and then the PostScript file is converted to PDF using the configured PostScript distiller engine. In some cases, PDF Converter can use a third-party application to convert a file directly to PDF. When using this option, PDF Converter requires a PostScript distiller engine, a PostScript printer, and the third-party applications used during the conversion. For more information about file formats that can be converted using this option, see Appendix A (File Formats Converted to PDF Using Third-Party Applications).

- Convert to PDF using OpenOffice—When running on either Windows or UNIX, PDF Converter can use OpenOffice to convert some file types directly to PDF. When using this option, PDF Converter requires only OpenOffice. For more information about file formats that can be converted using this option, see Appendix B (File Formats Converted to PDF Using OpenOffice).
- ❖ Convert to PDF using Outside In—PDF Converter includes Outside In X, which can be used on Windows to create PDF files of some content items. Outside In X is used to print the files to PostScript, and then the PostScript files are converted to PDF using the configured PostScript distiller engine. When using this option, PDF Converter requires only a PostScript distiller engine. For more information about file formats that can be converted using this option, see Appendix C (File Formats Converted to PDF Using Outside In X).



Important: Third-party applications used in conversions, a PostScript distiller engine, and a PostScript printer are not provided with PDF Converter. You must obtain all third-party applications required for the conversions you want to perform, as well as a PostScript distiller engine and a PostScript printer of your choice.

PDF Conversion Process Overview

PDF conversion occurs in one of two ways:

- 1. An application capable of opening the native file converts (or "prints") the file to PostScript, which is then routed to the distiller engine and converted to PDF.
- 2. A PDF file is created from an application capable of opening the native file and outputting it directly to PDF.

In addition, there might be customized preconversion and postconversion steps. The converted PDF files can be delivered to a content server, which stores them in the *weblayout* directory, which is the web-viewable file repository. The PDF files are then used as the web-viewable files for the content server. The generated PDF files are also included in the content server's full-text index.

The computer activity during the whole conversion process depends on how Inbound Refinery is set up and which conversion application is used. In some situations, conversion might take place entirely in the background, with no noticeable interaction. In others, files might be opened and printed to PostScript files, which are subsequently translated into PDF. In this case, applications and windows might be opened and closed automatically on the Inbound Refinery computer.

PRE-INSTALLATION TASKS AND CONSIDERATIONS

Make sure that you read, understand and comply with each of the following tasks and considerations before installing PDF Converter: □ PDF Converter version 10gR3 requires Inbound Refinery version 10gR3. It might be possible to use PDF Converter with other versions of Inbound Refinery, however, Oracle, Inc. cannot guarantee that PDF Converter version 10gR3 will function correctly when it is not used with a Inbound Refinery version 10gR3 instance. ☐ PDF Converter version 10gR3 is supported on the same Windows and UNIX operating systems as Inbound Refinery version 10gR3. For more information, refer to the Inbound Refinery Installation Guide. □ PDF Converter requires the InboundRefinerySupport component on each content server that is an agent to the refinery. The InboundRefinerySupport component should have been installed with Inbound Refinery. For more information, refer to the Inbound Refinery Installation Guide. ☐ Be mindful of the user account that you use to install and run PDF Converter. The same user must be used to install Inbound Refinery and PDF Converter, install all required third-party applications, and run Inbound Refinery and PDF Converter. □ PDF Converter is not distributed with a distiller engine for PostScript to PDF conversion or PDF optimization. This enables manual configuration with a variety of distiller engines after installing PDF Converter on Windows, which you must obtain or purchase from the corresponding third-party software manufacturer. For details, see Installing a Distiller Engine (page 4-7). ☐ After installing PDF Converter on Windows, you must you must install a PostScript printer on the PDF Converter computer. For details, see Installing the IDC PDF Converter Printer (page 4-10). ☐ If OpenOffice will be used with PDF Converter to create PDF files on UNIX, the target computer for PDF Converter requires access to a running X Window System display server (X Server). ☐ Due to the technical nature of operating systems, web servers, and browsers, Oracle, Inc. cannot warrant compatibility with all versions and features of third-party products.

OVERVIEW OF PDF CONVERTER INSTALLATION AND SETUP

The following is an overview of the basic steps required to install and set up PDF Converter 10gR3 on a 10gR3 refinery:

- 1. Install and enable the PDFConverter and/or the OpenOfficeConversion components on the refinery. If you are installing on UNIX, you only need to install and enable the OpenOfficeConversion component (enabling the *Convert to PDF using OpenOffice* option, which is the only PDF conversion option supported on UNIX). If you are installing on Windows and want to use third-party applications or Outside In X to create PDF files, you must also install the PDFConverter component (enabling the *Convert to PDF using third-party applications* and *Convert to PDF using Outside In* options). For details, see Installing PDF Converter (page 4-4).
- 2. If you are installing on Windows and want to use third-party applications or Outside In X to create PDF files, you must obtain and install a PostScript distiller engine on the PDF Converter computer. For details, see Installing a Distiller Engine (page 4-7).
- 3. If you are installing on Windows and want to use third-party applications or Outside In X to create PDF files, you must install a PostScript printer on the PDF Converter computer. For details, see Installing the IDC PDF Converter Printer (page 4-10).
- 4. If you are installing on UNIX, you must obtain and install OpenOffice on the PDF Converter computer. If you are installing on Windows and want to use third-party applications other than OpenOffice to create PDF files, you must obtain and install those applications on the PDF Converter computer. For details, see Installing Third-Party Applications for PDF Conversion (page 4-12).
- You must configure your content servers to send jobs to your refinery for PDF conversion. For details, see Configuring Content Servers to Send Jobs to PDF Converter (page 5-2).

INSTALLING PDF CONVERTER

PDF Converter is comprised of two separate components. Both components are installed on the refinery. The two components are:

- **❖** PDFConverter (refinery)
- OpenOfficeConversion (refinery)



Important: PDF Converter requires the InboundRefinerySupport component on each content server that is an agent to the refinery. The InboundRefinerySupport component should have been installed with Inbound Refinery. For more information, refer to the *Inbound Refinery Installation Guide*. It is imperative that the PDF Converter components are installed properly on the refinery and not on the content server. Should a reversal of the components occur, the PDF Converter will not work.

Installing PDF Converter Components Using Component Manager

To install the PDF Converter components on a refinery using Component Manager, complete the following steps:

- 1. Open a new browser window.
- 2. Log into the content server or refinery that is running the Admin Server for the refinery as a system administrator.
- 3. Launch the Admin Server.
- 4. On the Content Admin Server page, click the button of the refinery where you want to install the PDF Converter components. The status page for the refinery is displayed.
- 5. In the option list for the refinery, click the **Component Manager** link. The Component Manager page is displayed.
- 6. Click the **Browse** button next to the **Install New Component** field.

- 7. Navigate to the PDF Converter components on the Inbound Refinery distribution media:
 - If you are installing on UNIX, you only need to install and enable the
 OpenOfficeConversion component (OpenOfficeConversion.zip). This enables the
 Convert to PDF using OpenOffice option, which is the only PDF conversion
 option supported on UNIX.
 - If you are installing on Windows and want to use third-party applications or Outside In X to create PDF files, you must also install the PDFConverter component (*PDFConverter.zip*). This enables the *Convert to PDF using third-party applications* and *Convert to PDF using Outside In* options.
- 8. Double-click on the component zip file or select the component zip file and click **Open**.
- 9. Click **Install**. An overview page is displayed providing a list of the items that will be installed.
- 10. Click **Continue**. All required files are now installed. This might take a few minutes.
- 11. After all files have been copied, a message is displayed stating that the component was uploaded and installed successfully.
- 12. Click the link to return to the Component Manager.
- 13. Select the component in the Disabled Components list and click **Enable**.
- 14. Repeat steps 6–13 if you want to install and enable another component.
- 15. In the option list for the refinery, click the **Start/Stop Content Server** link.
- 16. Click the restart button to restart the refinery.

Installing PDF Converter Components Using Component Wizard

To install the PDF Converter components on a refinery using Component Wizard, complete the following steps:

- 1. Start Component Wizard:

 - ❖ In UNIX, navigate to the <*refinery_install_dir*>/bin directory. At the command prompt, type ComponentWizard.

The Component Wizard main screen and the Component List screen are displayed.

- 2. Click **Install**. The Install dialog is displayed.
- 3. Click **Select** and navigate to the PDF Converter components on the Inbound Refinery distribution media:
 - If you are installing on UNIX, you only need to install and enable the
 OpenOfficeConversion component (OpenOfficeConversion.zip). This enables the
 Convert to PDF using OpenOffice option, which is the only PDF conversion
 option supported on UNIX.
 - If you are installing on Windows and want to use third-party applications or Outside In X to create PDF files, you must also install the PDFConverter component (*PDFConverter.zip*). This enables the *Convert to PDF using third-party applications* and *Convert to PDF using Outside In* options.
- 4. Double-click on the component zip file or select the component zip file and click **Open**. The Install list displays the files that will be installed.
- 5. Click **OK**. All required files are now installed. This might take a few minutes.
- 6. After all files have been copied, you are prompted to confirm enabling the component. Click **Yes**.
- 7. If you want to install and enable another component, choose **Options—Install** and repeat steps 3–6.
- 8. Close Component Wizard.
- 9. Restart the refinery.

INSTALLING A DISTILLER ENGINE

The purpose of PDF Converter is to convert files from their native format to the PDF file format. This is done to enable viewing of the file in a standard web browser, and to enable indexing of content whose native file format is not supported by some search engines used in a Content Server implementation (such as some e-mail formats).

When running on either Windows or UNIX, PDF Converter can use OpenOffice to convert some file types directly to PDF. When using this option, PDF Converter requires only OpenOffice; a distiller engine is not required. For more information about file formats that can be converted using this option, see Appendix B (*File Formats Converted to PDF Using OpenOffice*).

When running on Windows, there are two additional options for converting files to PDF:

- PDF Converter can use several third-party applications to create PDF files of content items. In most cases, a third-party application that can open and print the file is used to print the file to PostScript, and then the PostScript file is converted to PDF using the configured PostScript distiller engine. In some cases, PDF Converter can use a third-party application to convert a file directly to PDF. For details on file formats that can be converted to PDF using third-party applications, see Appendix A (File Formats Converted to PDF Using Third-Party Applications).
- PDF Converter includes Outside In X, which can be used on Windows to create PDF files of some content items. Outside In X is used to print the files to PostScript, and then the PostScript files are converted to PDF using the configured PostScript distiller engine. For details on file formats that can be converted to PDF using Outside In X, see Appendix C (*File Formats Converted to PDF Using Outside In X*).

Additional steps might be performed on the resultant PDF file after conversion, such as optimizing the PDF for a smaller file size and faster deployment.

A distiller engine is not provided with PDF Converter. You must obtain a distiller engine of your choice. The distiller engine you choose must be able to execute conversions via a command-line. The procedures in this section use AFPL Ghostscript as an example. This is a free, robust distiller engine that performs both PostScript to PDF conversion and optimization of PDF files during or after conversion.

To install a distiller engine, complete the following steps:

- 1. Make sure that the PDFConverter component has been installed on the refinery. For details, see Installing PDF Converter (page 4-4).
- 2. Log in to the PDF Converter computer. Be mindful of the user account that you use. The same user must be used to install Inbound Refinery and PDF Converter, install all required third-party applications, and run Inbound Refinery and PDF Converter.
- 3. Obtain and install a distiller engine on the PDF Converter computer. A freeware version of AFPL Ghostscript is available from the Internet at http://www.ghostscript.com/awki.
- 4. You can configure the your distiller engine settings using the Inbound Refinery administration interface:
 - a. Open a new browser window and log into the refinery.
 - b. Select **Conversion Settings—Third-Party Application Settings**. The Third-Party Application Settings page is displayed.
 - c. Click the Distiller Engine Options button. The Distiller Engine Options Page is displayed.
 - d. To use Ghostscript, complete the following steps:
 - Select the **Use Ghostscript** check box.
 - In the **Path to Ghostscript installation directory** field, enter the path to the main Ghostscript installation directory. For example: c:/gs/gs8.54
 - e. To use a different distiller engine, complete the following steps:
 - Clear the **Use Ghostscript** check box.
 - In the **Path to generic PostScript to PDF engine** field, enter the path to the executable or script file of the PostScript to PDF distiller engine. For example: *c:/gs/gs8.54/lib/ps2pdf14.bat*
 - In the **Parameters to pass to generic PostScript to PDF engine** field, enter the parameters to be passed to the PostScript to PDF distiller engine. This field is Idoc Script enabled. Different distillers have different parameter options.

For example, if the path to the distiller engine is c:\utils\PostScript\distll.exe and the distiller engine takes the parameters [options <psPath> [<pdfPath>], at a command prompt you would enter c:\utils\PostScript\distll.exe c:\temp\mypsFile.ps -optimize -1.3 -crop c:\temp\file.pdf

To achieve this result through PDF Converter, you would set the following:

Path to generic PostScript to PDF engine:

c:/utils/PostScript/distll.exe

Parameters to pass to generic PostScript to PDF engine:

<\$postscriptFile\$> -optimize -1.3 -crop <\$pdfFile\$>

To achieve maximum flexibility, this entry uses the tokens \$postscriptFile\$>
for the PostScript file path and \$pdfFile\$> for the output file. Consider these
tokens as place holders and not actual path references.

• In the **Path to generic PDF optimization engine** field, enter the path to the executable or script file capable of optimizing PDF files.

For example: c:/gs/gs8.54/lib/pdfopt.bat

 In the Parameters to pass to generic PDF optimization engine field, enter the parameters to be passed to the distiller engine during PDF optimization. This field is Idoc Script enabled. Different distillers have different parameter options.

For example, if the path to the distiller engine is *c:\utils\PostScript\opt.exe* and the distiller engine takes the parameters *[options <psPath> [<pdfPath>]*, at a command prompt you would enter c:\utils\PostScript\opt.exe c:\temp\myPDF.pdf c:\temp\file.pdf

To achieve this result through PDF Converter, you would set the following:

Path to generic PDF optimization engine:

c:/utils/PostScript/opt.exe

Parameters to pass to generic PDF optimization engine:

<\$pdfFile\$> <\$optimizedPdfFile\$>

To achieve maximum flexibility, this entry uses the tokens <\$pdfFile\$> for the PostScript file path and <\$optimizedPdfFile\$> for the output file. Consider these tokens as place holders and not actual path references.



Note: Ghostscript can also be configured using the "generic" PostScript to PDF engine and PDF optimization engine fields.

f. Click **Update** to save your changes.

INSTALLING THE IDC PDF CONVERTER PRINTER

After installing PDF Converter on Windows, you must install a PostScript printer on the PDF Converter computer if you want to use third-party applications or Outside In X to create PDF files. To install the IDC PDF Converter Printer, complete the following steps:



Important: Make sure that the *Print Spooler* service is installed and running on the Inbound Refinery computer before attempting to install a printer. If this service is not installed and running, Microsoft Windows will not allow any printers to be installed.

- 1. Log in to the PDF Converter computer. Be mindful of the user account that you use. The same user must be used to install Inbound Refinery and PDF Converter, install all required third-party applications, and run Inbound Refinery and PDF Converter.
- 2. Close all other Windows programs.
- 3. Create a *c:\temp* directory.
- 4. Launch the Windows Add Printer Wizard.
- 5. Click **Next** to continue.
- Select the Local printer attached to this computer radio button, clear the
 Automatically detect and install my Plug and Play printer check box, and click
 Next to continue.
- 7. Select the **Create a new port** radio button, select **Local Port** from the drop-down menu, and click **Next** to continue.
- 8. Enter *c:\temp\idcoutput.ps* as the port name, and click **OK**. The *idcoutput.ps* file does not need to exist in the *temp* directory; it will be created by PDF Converter.
- 9. Click Have Disk.
- 10. Click Browse.
- 11. Navigate to the PostScript printer driver that you want to use. If you are using AFPL Ghostscript as your PostScript distiller engine, it is recommended that you use the AFPL Ghostscript printer driver that is installed with AFPL Ghostscript. Navigate to the *ghostpdf.inf* file located in the *<ghostscript_install_dir>\lib* directory.
 - Select the printer driver, and click Open.
- 12. Click **OK** to copy the printer files.
- 13. Click **Next** to continue. If you receive a message stating that driver is not digitally signed, this is not an issue; you can still continue.

- 14. Enter **IDC PDF Converter** for the printer name. The IDC PDF Converter printer can be set as your default printer, but it does not have to be. Click **Next** to continue.
- 15. Select the **Do not share this printer** radio button and click **Next** to continue.
- 16. Select the **No** radio button to not print a test page and click **Next** to continue.
- 17. Click **Finish** to install the printer. If you receive a message stating the printer has not passed Windows testing, click **Yes/Continue Anyway** to continue.
- 18. When the printer is installed, right-click on the IDC PDF Converter printer icon and select **Properties** to display the printer properties window.
- 19. On the General tab, make sure the printer is named IDC PDF Converter.
- 20. On the Sharing tab, make sure the *Not shared/Do not share this printer* radio button is selected.
- 21. On the Ports tab, make sure that the selected port is *c:\temp\idcoutput.ps*, and that it is specified as a Local Port. If the port has not been added, complete the following steps to add the port (the port only needs to be added once; if it was added correctly during the installation of the printer, it does not need to be added again):
 - a. Click Add Port.
 - b. In the list of available printer ports, select *Local Port*, and click **New Port**.
 - c. Specify *c:\temp\idcoutput.ps* as the port name, and click **OK**. The *c:\temp* directory must exist, but the *idcoutput.ps* file will be created by PDF Converter.
 - d. Click **Close** to close the Printer Ports dialog.
- 22. On the Advanced tab, make sure the **Print directly to the printer** radio button is selected.
- 23. Click **Apply** to save any changes.
- 24. Click **OK** to close the printer properties window.

Considerations for All Applications

The following installation tips and recommended settings apply to all third-party applications:

- When installing any third-party application, make sure that you are logged on as the same user used to install and run Inbound Refinery and its conversion add-ons. If you do not, conversion to PDF might fail; for example, because some of the conversion engines might not be able to locate the applications.
- ☐ If you do not use the recommended configuration settings for the third-party applications, the refinery process might time out.
- ☐ For a file to be converted automatically by PDF Converter, the third-party application used must be able to open the file without any user intervention. After completing the software installation, open the application and turn off any extra screens that start up before the application can be used, such as startup dialogs, tip wizards, or update notices. These cause the refinery process to time out. Password-protected files will also time out unless you enter a password before processing.

Important: To keep a conversion of a Microsoft Office file from timing out, all functions requiring user input should be disabled. These include password protection, security notifications, such as disabling of macros, and online access requests to show online content or participate in user feedback programs. For details on how to disable these and other similar features, refer to the Microsoft documentation for each product.

Word, Excel, PowerPoint, and Publisher

The following installation tips and recommended settings apply to Microsoft Word, Excel, PowerPoint, and Publisher:

- ☐ When installing this software on the refinery computer, perform a custom installation. Install everything except Outlook. This is because Outlook, by default, creates a journal of all Microsoft Office file activities. As the journal grows, performance deteriorates. If Outlook is absolutely required, turn off the journaling function.
- □ When installing this software on Windows 2000 Server, make sure that Microsoft Snapshot is installed. To verify that Microsoft Snapshot is installed, search for the *snapview.ocx* file in the *C:\Program Files\Common Files\Microsoft Shared\Snapshot Viewer* directory. If you do not find the *snapview.ocx* file, install Microsoft Snapshot from the Microsoft Office media.
- □ Send the license information the first time you start any of the applications.

	Make sure that you turn off automatic spelling and grammar checking (Options—Tools—Spelling & Grammar). These features might cause unexpected pop-up windows to appear, which time out the refinery process.
	Make sure that you turn off <i>Show content and links from Microsoft Online</i> on the Tools—Options—General tab under the Online category, and opt out of the Customer Experience Improvement Program on the Tools—Options—General tab under the Customer Feedback category. If you do not, these files might time out.

	All files should be set up so that the printer paper size and orientation matches the drawing page size and orientation. Otherwise, links will not be converted correctly (they will be placed in the wrong location). For example, if the printer paper is set to Letter/Landscape, the drawing page should also be set to Letter/Landscape.
	Visio files created using the Cross-Functional Flowchart template might cause a pop-up dialog to appear when Visio attempts to open the file, and thus the refinery process will time out unless this dialog is cleared manually on the refinery computer. To prevent this from happening, do not base files on the Cross-Functional Flowchart template. You can use OutsideIn to convert Visio files based on the Cross-Functional Flowchart template. However, please note that Visio hyperlinks are not converted by OutsideIn.

OpenOffice

The following installation tips and recommended settings apply to OpenOffice:

- ☐ The OpenOffice Listener must always be running on the Inbound Refinery computer, or PDF conversion will fail.
- ☐ When running OpenOffice on Windows, it is recommended that you configure an OpenOffice port in the *Setup.xcu* file and run the OpenOffice Quickstarter. The Quickstarter adds shortcuts to OpenOffice applications to your system tray and runs the OpenOffice Listener as a background process.
 - ❖ By default, the Quickstarter loads at system startup, and you should see the OpenOffice icon in your system tray. To start the Quickstarter, launch any OpenOffice application. The application can then be closed, and the Quickstarter will remain running.
 - ❖ To set the Quickstarter to load at system startup, right-click the OpenOffice icon in the system tray, and choose **Load OpenOffice.org During System Start-Up**.



Note: OpenOffice can be launched by Inbound Refinery running as a service on Windows XP, 2000, 2003. However, since you must be logged in to Windows to run the OpenOffice Listener, you must always be logged in to Windows when using OpenOffice for PDF conversion (even when running Inbound Refinery as a service).

- ☐ When running OpenOffice on UNIX, it is recommended that you configure an OpenOffice port in the *Setup.xcu* file and run soffice, which acts as the Listener. If desired, soffice can be used on Windows instead of the Quickstarter.
 - ★ To start soffice, launch the *soffice.exe* file located in the following directory:
 Windows: <OpenOffice_install_dir>\program\
 UNIX: <OpenOffice_install_dir>/program
- To configure an OpenOffice port in the *Setup.xcu* file, complete the following steps:
 - 1. Open the *Setup.xcu* file in a text editor. This file is located in the following directory:

Windows: <*OpenOffice_install_dir>\share\registry\data\org\openoffice* **UNIX:** <*OpenOffice_install_dir>\share\registry\data\org\openoffice*

3. Insert the following prop/> element on the same level as the existing elements, as the first element:

This configures OpenOffice to provide a socket on port 8100, where it will serve connections via the UNO remote protocol (URP). Be careful to block port 8100 for connections from outside your network in your firewall. Using port 8100 is recommended. However, it might be necessary to adjust the port number if port 8100 is already in use on your machine. In this case, replace 8100 in the element with the port number that you want to use.

- 4. After making changes to the *Setup.xcu* file, stop and restart the Quickstarter (Windows) or soffice (UNIX or Windows).
- As an alternative to configuring an OpenOffice port in the *Setup.xcu* file and then running the OpenOffice Quickstarter (Windows) or soffice (UNIX or Windows), you can launch soffice from the command line with parameters. However, these settings only apply to the current session. To launch soffice from the command line with parameters, complete the following steps:
 - 1. Open a command window and navigate to the following directory:

```
Windows: < OpenOffice_install_dir>\program\
UNIX: < OpenOffice_install_dir>/program
```

2. Enter the following command:

```
soffice "-accept=socket,port=8100;urp;"
```

☐ To verify that OpenOffice is listening on the specified port, open a command window and enter one of the following commands:

An output similar to the following shows that OpenOffice is listening:

- ☐ To configure Inbound Refinery to use OpenOffice, complete the following steps:
 - 1. Inbound Refinery requires several OpenOffice .jar files for use during OpenOffice conversions. Copy the following OpenOffice .jar files from the < OpenOffice_install_dir>/program/classes/ directory to the < refinery_install_dir>/custom/OpenOfficeConversion/classes/openofficejars/ directory:
 - juh.jar
 - jurt.jar
 - ridl.jar
 - unoil.jar
 - 2. If you did not use port 8100 when modifying the OpenOffice *Setup.xcu* file, complete the following steps:
 - a. In the Inbound Refinery administration interface, select Conversion
 Settings—Third-Party Application Settings. The Third-Party Application
 Settings page is displayed.
 - b. Click the **Options** button for OpenOffice. The OpenOffice Options Page is displayed.
 - c. In the *Port to Connect to the OpenOffice Quickstarter Listener* field, enter the port that you used when modifying the OpenOffice *Setup.xcu* file.
 - d. Click Update.
 - 3. Restart the refinery.

INSTALLING A PDF READER PLUGIN ON CLIENT COMPUTERS

A PDF reader plugin (such as Adobe Acrobat Reader) must be installed on all client computers used to view PDF files generated by PDF Converter through the content server web interface.

It is recommended that you install Adobe Acrobat Reader 6.0.1 or higher on all client computers for the best results when viewing PDF files generated by PDF Converter. You can download Acrobat Reader from the Internet at http://www.adobe.com/products/acrobat/readstep2.html.



Important: Adobe Acrobat Reader 6.0 is unable to print a PDF when a filename and URL has more than 256 characters. URLs in workflow and subscription email notifications can easily exceed 256 characters.

When you have Adobe Acrobat Reader 6.0 installed and try to print a PDF with a filename and URL that has more than 256 characters, the document will not print and the following message is displayed: *Could not start print job*.

Adobe has fixed this problem in Adobe Acrobat Reader 6.0.1. Download and install Adobe Acrobat Reader 6.0.1 or higher to solve this problem.

UNINSTALLING PDF CONVERTER

To uninstall PDF Converter, complete the following steps:

- 1. Disable and uninstall the PDFConverter and OpenOfficeConversion components using either Component Manager or Component Wizard.
- 2. Restart the refinery.
- 3. If desired, delete the following directories that are installed by these components:
 - <refinery install dir>/custom/OpenOfficeConversion
 - <refinery_install_dir>/custom/PDFConverter
- 4. If desired, you can uninstall third-party applications used for conversion.

UPDATING PDF CONVERTER

An existing PDF Converter version 10gR3 can be updated to a newer version 10gR3 build. Updates from pre-10gR3 versions of PDF Converter to version 10gR3 are not supported. To update PDF Converter, complete the following steps:

- 1. Disable and uninstall the PDFConverter and OpenOfficeConversion components using either Component Manager or Component Wizard.
- 2. Restart the refinery.
- 3. Install and enable the new PDFConverter and OpenOfficeConversion components. For details, see Installing PDF Converter (page 4-4).
- 4. Restart the refinery.

CONFIGURING CONTENT SERVERS TO SEND JOBS TO PDF CONVERTER

File extensions, file formats, and conversions are used in Content Server to define how content items should be processed by Inbound Refinery and its conversion add-ons. You must configure each content server to send files to refineries for conversion. When a file extension is mapped to a file format and a conversion, files of that type will be sent for conversion when they are checked into the content server. You can configure your file extension, file format, and conversion mappings in your content servers using either the File Formats Wizard or the Configuration Manager.

All conversions required for PDF Converter are available by default in Content Server. For more information about configuring file extensions, file formats, and conversions in your content servers, refer to the *Inbound Refinery Administration Guide*.

SETTING ACCEPTED CONVERSIONS

Conversions available in the content server should match those available in the refinery. When a file format is mapped to a conversion in the content server, files of that format will be sent for conversion upon checkin. One or more refineries must be set up to accept that conversion. You set the conversions that the refinery will accept and queue maximums on the Conversion Listing page. All conversions required for PDF Converter are available by default in both Content Server and Inbound Refinery. For more information about setting accepted conversions, refer to the *Inbound Refinery Administration Guide*.

SETTING PDF FILES AS THE PRIMARY WEB-VIEWABLE RENDITION

To set PDF files as the primary web-viewable rendition, complete the following steps:

- 1. Log into the refinery.
- 2. Select **Conversion Settings—Primary Web Rendition**. The Primary Web-Viewable Rendition page is displayed.
- 3. Select one or more of the following conversion methods:
 - ❖ Convert to PDF using Third-Party Applications—when running on Windows, PDF Converter can use several third-party applications to create PDF files of content items. In most cases, a third-party application that can open and print the file is used to print the file to PostScript, and then the PostScript file is converted to PDF using the configured PostScript distiller engine. In some cases, PDF Converter can use a third-party application to convert a file directly to PDF. For more information about file formats that can be converted using this option, see Appendix A (File Formats Converted to PDF Using Third-Party Applications). When using this option, PDF Converter requires the following:
 - A PostScript distiller engine. For details, see Installing a Distiller Engine (page 4-7).
 - A PostScript printer. For details, see Installing the IDC PDF Converter Printer (page 4-10).
 - The third-party applications used during the conversion. For details, see Installing Third-Party Applications for PDF Conversion (page 4-12).
 - Convert to PDF using OpenOffice—when running on either Windows or UNIX, PDF Converter can use OpenOffice to convert some file types directly to PDF. For more information about file formats that can be converted using this option, see Appendix B (*File Formats Converted to PDF Using OpenOffice*). When using this option, PDF Converter requires only OpenOffice. For details, see OpenOffice (page 4-16).
 - Convert to PDF using Outside In—PDF Converter includes Outside In X, which can be used on Windows to create PDF files of some content items. Outside In X is used to print the files to PostScript, and then the PostScript files are converted to PDF using the configured PostScript distiller engine. For more information about file formats that can be converted using this option, see Appendix C (*File Formats Converted to PDF Using Outside In X*). When using this option, PDF Converter requires only a PostScript distiller engine. For details, see Installing a Distiller Engine (page 4-7).

Inbound Refinery will attempt to convert each incoming file based on the native file format. If the format is not supported for conversion by the first selected method, Inbound Refinery will check to see if the next selected method supports the format, and so on. Inbound Refinery will attempt to convert the file using the first selected method that supports the conversion of the format.

For example, consider that you select both the *Convert to PDF using third-party applications* option and the *Convert to PDF using Outside In* option. You then send a Microsoft Word file to the refinery for conversion. Since the Microsoft Word file format is supported for conversion to PDF using a third-party application (Microsoft Word), Inbound Refinery will attempt to use the *Convert to PDF using third-party applications* method to convert the file to PDF as the primary web-viewable rendition. If this method fails, Inbound Refinery will not attempt the *Convert to PDF using Outside In* method. However, if you send a JustWrite file to the refinery for conversion, this file format is not supported for conversion to PDF using the *Convert to PDF using third-party applications* method, so Inbound Refinery will check to see if this format is supported by the *Convert to PDF using Outside In* method. Since this format is supported by Outside In, Inbound Refinery will attempt to convert the file to PDF using Outside In.

- 4. Click **Update** to save your changes.
- When using the Convert to PDF using Third-Party Applications method or the Convert to PDF using Outside In method, click the corresponding PDF Web-Viewable Options button. The PDF Options Page is displayed.
- 6. Set your PDF options, and click **Update** to save your changes.

CONFIGURING THIRD-PARTY APPLICATION SETTINGS

To change third-party application settings, complete the following steps:

- 1. Log into the refinery.
- 2. Select Conversion Settings—Third-Party Application Settings. The Third-Party Application Settings page is displayed.
- 3. Click the **Options** button for the third-party application. The corresponding options page is displayed. The following third-party application options pages are specific to PDF Converter:
 - Distiller Engine Options Page
 - Word Options Page
 - Excel Options Page
 - PowerPoint Options Page
 - Visio Options Page
 - InDesign Options Page
 - OpenOffice Options Page
- 4. Change the third-party application options.
- 5. Click **Update** to save your changes.

CONFIGURING TIMEOUT SETTINGS FOR PDF CONVERSIONS

To configure timeout settings for PDF file generation, complete the following steps:

- 1. Log into the refinery.
- 2. Select **Conversion Settings—Timeout Settings**. The Timeout Settings page is displayed.
- 3. Enter the **Minimum (in minutes)**, **Maximum (in minutes)**, and **Factor** for the following conversion operations:
 - Native to PostScript—the stage in which the original (native) file is converted to a PostScript (PS) file.
 - **PostScript to PDF**—the stage in which the PS file is converted to a Portable Document Format (PDF) file.
 - FrameMaker to PostScript—these values apply to the conversion of Adobe FrameMaker files to PS files.
 - **PDF to Post Production**—the stage in which any processing is performed after the file has been converted to PDF format.

For more information about how timeout settings are calculated and examples, refer to the *Inbound Refinery Administration Guide*.

4. Click **Update** to save your changes.

SETTING MARGINS WHEN USING OUTSIDE IN X

PDF Converter includes Outside In X version 8.1.9. When using Outside In X to convert graphics to PDF, you can set the margins for the generated PDF from 0–4.23 inches or 0–10.76 cm. By default, PDF Converter uses 1-inch margins on the top, bottom, right, and left.

To adjust these margins, complete the following steps:

- 1. Use a text editor to open the *intradoc.cfg* file located in the <*refinery_install_dir*>/bin directory.
- 2. Change the following settings:
 - OIXTopMargin=
 - OIXBottomMargin=
 - OIXLeftMargin=
 - OIXRightMargin=
- 3. To change the margin units from inches to centimeters, set <code>OIXMarqinUnitInch=false</code>.
- 4. Save your changes to the *intradoc.cfg* file.
- 5. Restart the refinery.

Using OpenOffice Without Logging In to Host

Overview

PDF Converter can use OpenOffice to convert some file types directly to PDF. This is done by configuring the OpenOffice listener, which must be running in order for conversions to be successful. Typically, you must be logged in to the computer on which OpenOffice is installed in order for OpenOffice to be able to open and process any documents. However, the OpenOffice listener can be run in headless mode with no graphical user interface.



Note: Before setting up the OpenOffice listener to run in headless mode, confirm that documents can be converted to PDF using OpenOffice running in a non-headless mode. Also, turn off any extra screens that start up before OpenOffice can be used, such as startup dialogs, tip wizards, or update notices. These cause the refinery process to time out, because conversions will not proceed until these screens are cleared and they are not displayed in headless mode.

Setting Up Headless Mode on a Windows Host

To convert documents to PDF using OpenOffice without being logged in to a Windows host, you must create a custom service to run the OpenOffice listener in headless mode. The Windows Resource Kits provide the INSTSRV.EXE and SRVANY.EXE utilities to create custom services.

To set up a custom OpenOffice service, perform these steps:

- 2. Open the Registry Editor by selecting **Start—Run**, entering **regedit**, and clicking **OK**. The Registry Editor is displayed.



Caution: Backup your registry before editing it.

- 3. Backup your registry by selecting **File—Export**, entering a name for the backup file, and clicking **Save**. Remember the location to which the backup file is saved should you need to restore the registry.
- 4. Navigate to the new registry key created in step 1 and select the new service key. The new key is located at:
 - HKEY LOCAL MACHINE\SYSTEM\CurrentControlSet\Services\<service name>
- 5. With the new key selected, choose **Edit—New—Key**, and name it **Parameters**.
- 6. Right-click on the **Parameters** key, select **New—String Value**, and name the value **Application**.
- 7. Right-click on the **Application** string and select **Modify**.
- 8. Type in the full path to soffice.exe, appended with **-headless**. For example: C:\Program Files\OpenOffice2.0\program\soffice.exe -headless
- 9. Close the Registry Editor and restart the computer.
- Once the computer has successfully restarted, select Start—Settings—Control
 Panel—Administrative Tools—Services to open Windows Services. The Windows
 Services screen is displayed.
- 11. Right-click the service you just created, select **Properties**, and ensure that the service is set up to start automatically
- 12. Select the **Log On** tab and enable **This account**. This enables the service to run using a specific user account
- 13. Enter the same user credentials that the Inbound Refinery is using to run.



Note: The Inbound Refinery user will need to have the right to log on as a service on the Inbound Refinery computer.

14. Start the service, accept the changes and close Windows Services.

Setting Up Headless Mode on a UNIX Host

To convert documents to PDF using OpenOffice without being logged in to a UNIX host, the OpenOffice listener must run in headless mode with no graphical user interface, using a virtual buffer display (X server).



Important: Each UNIX environment is unique. This information is a general guideline for setting up the OpenOffice listener in headless mode on UNIX platforms. An example of the procedure for Red Hat EL4 is also included.

In general, to configure the OpenOffice listener to run in headless mode on UNIX platforms, you must perform the following steps:



Note: Before setting up OpenOffice to run in headless mode, ensure that Inbound Refinery is installed and configured correctly to successfully convert documents to PDF using OpenOffice in non-headless mode.

- 1. Create a startup script to run Inbound Refinery when the system boots up.
- 2. Configure a virtual X server and create a startup script to run it when the system boots up, to enable OpenOffice to run.
- 3. Create a startup script to run OpenOffice in headless mode when the system boots up.
- 4. Configure the system to run the startup scripts in the following order:
 - a. start Inbound Refinery
 - b. start the virtual X server
 - c. start OpenOffice



Note: The virtual X server must be started prior to starting OpenOffice, or OpenOffice will not run. Additionally, remember to ensure that the web server is also configured to run when the system boots up.

Example: Setting Up OpenOffice Headless Mode on Red Hat EL4

After ensuring that Inbound Refinery is installed and working correctly in non-headless mode, you must create a startup script to run it when the system boots up. Ensure the command to start the refinery is prefixed by su idcUser -c, as startup scripts are executed as root, but Inbound Refinery cannot be started as root. Also, the Admin Server must be started in the same manner as the refinery, and the startup script must have execution permissions.

In this example, the refinery installation path is /u1/work/ibr1 and the refinery user is idcUser.

1. Navigate to /etc/init.d and create the file ibr as a script to start the refinery:

2. Install and configure a virtual X server (frame buffer) to allow OpenOffice to run. In this example, the Xvfb package from http://www.xfree86.org is used. The Xvfb.tgz file is unpacked and a copy of the Xvfb executable is placed in the /usr/X11R6/bin directory and ensured that it is executable. For this example, the following options were used:

3. Create a startup script to run OpenOffice in headless mode when the system boots up, as the same user running the refinery. Make sure to use the display defined for the Xvfb. In this example the user is idcUser, and OpenOffice 2.2 is installed in the directory /u1/apps/OpenOffice/.



Note: Remember to turn off any extra screens that start up before OpenOffice can be used, such as startup dialogs, tip wizards, or update notices. These cause the refinery process to time out, because conversions will not proceed until these screens are cleared and they are not displayed in headless mode.

Navigate to /etc/init.d as root and create the file openoffice:

- 4. Configure the system to run the startup scripts by editing the /etc/rc.d/rc.local file. UNIX platforms other than the one used in this example (Red Hat EL4) may have different methods to configure scripts to run at boot time. The scripts should run in the following order, as OpenOffice requires the virtual X server to be running prior to starting up:
 - a. start Inbound Refinery
 - b. start the virtual X server
 - c. start OpenOffice

To run the scripts when starting up in this example, navigate to /etc/rc.d and add the following lines to the file rc.local:



5. Reboot you system and make sure that the scripts are run successfully during boot. Check in a document for conversion, verify that Inbound Refinery accepts the job, OpenOffice opens the file and creates a valid PDF, and that the document is returned and released in the Content Server.

ABOUT CONVERTING MICROSOFT OFFICE FILES TO PDF

When running on Windows, PDF Converter can use Microsoft Office to convert Microsoft Office files to PDF files. The following Microsoft Office versions are supported:

- Microsoft Office 2000
- Microsoft Office XP (2002)
- Microsoft Office 2003
- Microsoft Office 2007



Note: Support for Microsoft Office 2007 excludes support for Microsoft Project 2007.

Please note the following important general considerations:

- ❖ If you are using Microsoft Office 2000, it is strongly recommended that you download and install Service Pack 1 or 2. If you are using Microsoft Office XP (2002), it is strongly recommended that you download and install Service Pack 1. The Service Packs can be downloaded from the Microsoft website at http://www.microsoft.com/downloads/
- Microsoft Office is used to convert Microsoft Office files to PDF when the Convert to PDF Using third-party applications option is selected on the Primary Web-Viewable Rendition page.
- ❖ PDF Converter can convert a number of special features in Microsoft Office files into links in the generated PDF files. You set the conversion options for Microsoft Office files using the Third-Party Application Settings page.
- ❖ To keep a conversion of a Microsoft Office file from timing out, all functions requiring user input should be disabled. These include password protection, security notifications, such as disabling of macros, and online access requests to show online content or participate in user feedback programs. For details on how to disable these and other similar features, refer to the Microsoft documentation for each product.
- ❖ If a Microsoft Office file was converted to a PDF file successfully, but one or more links in the file could not be converted to links in the PDF file, the conversion status of that file is set to Incomplete. To prevent this from happening, you can set AllowSkippedHyperlinkToCauseIncomplete=False in the *intradoc.cfg* configuration file located in the <*refinery_install_dir*>\bin\ directory.

CONVERTING MICROSOFT WORD FILES TO PDF

Consider the following when running PDF Converter on Windows and using Microsoft Word to convert Word files to PDF:

- ❖ Any information in a Word file that is outside of the document's print area will not be converted to PDF.
- A Password-protected files will time out unless you enter a password before processing.
- ❖ On Word 2003, make sure that you turn off *Show content and links from Microsoft Online* on the **Tools—Options—General** tab under the Online category, and opt out of the Customer Experience Improvement Program on the **Tools—Options—General** tab under the Customer Feedback category. If you do not, these files might time out.
- Options for the conversion of Word hyperlinks to PDF can be found on the Word Options Page.
- The following types of hyperlinks in Word files can be converted to PDF:
 - Absolute URL links (for example, http://www.company.com). You can also use links that specify targets on the page (for example http://idvm001/ibr/portal.htm#target). Note that in order to be processed as an absolute URL link, Word must return the http://prefix as a part of the link. All supported versions of Microsoft Word automatically enforce this rule.
 - Relative URL links (for example, ../../../portal.htm). Note that these links do not contain any server name or protocol prefix. The Reader simply attempts to open the file referenced by the link relative to the file you are currently viewing. Office applications, including Word, often mishandle the relative link address unless a hyperlink base is set (Word tries to help by converting the address to an absolute path). To work around this, you can select the Support Relative URL Links option. on the Word Options panel. When Support Relative URL Links is selected, the hyperlink base is set before the links are processed.
 - Mailto links (links to e-mail addresses; for example mailto:support@company.com). Note that in order to be processed as an e-mail link, Word must return the mailto: prefix as a part of the link. All supported versions of Microsoft Word automatically enforce this rule.
 - Table of Contents links (converted to bookmarks in the generated PDF file).
 - Bookmarks (internal links to auto-generated or author-generated bookmarks).
 - Standard heading styles (Heading 1, Heading 2, etc., which are converted to bookmarks in the generated PDF file).

- Links to footnotes and endnotes.
- Hyperlinks in text boxes are not converted.
- Hyperlinked AutoShapes and objects (for example, pictures or WordArt objects) located in tables are not converted.
- Hyperlinks in nested tables (that is, tables inserted within other tables) can be converted as long as the tables are not inserted in the first line of the document. When nested tables are inserted in the first line of the document, any hyperlinks in the nested tables are not converted properly.
- ❖ You might notice in some generated PDF files that the "hotspot" for a hyperlink is sometimes slightly off from the actual text (within a character or two). To date there are no know problems related to this occurrence, and there is currently no solution.

CONVERTING MICROSOFT EXCEL FILES TO PDF

Consider the following when running PDF Converter on Windows and using Microsoft Excel to convert Excel files to PDF:

- ❖ Any information in an Excel file that is outside of the document's print area will not be converted to PDF
- A Password-protected files will time out unless you enter a password before processing.
- On Excel 2003, make sure that you turn off Show content and links from Microsoft Online on the Tools—Options—General tab under the Online category, and opt out of the Customer Experience Improvement Program on the Tools—Options—General tab under the Customer Feedback category. If you do not, these files might time out.

- ❖ Due to implementation issues within Excel, and to a lesser extent the MSOfficeConverter.exe, there are some limitations on how Excel hyperlinks are processed. To understand these issues, some background information on how Excel workbooks are printed to PostScript is helpful. An Excel workbook cannot be printed to PostScript in one step (if that was done, page layout options would be ignored and the resulting PDF would not resemble the workbook). Instead, each worksheet is printed to PostScript individually. The worksheets are then combined to produce a single PDF file. PDF Converter copies (by the MSOfficeConverter) the multiple PostScript files into a single PostScript file, and the large PostScript file is converted to PDF.
- Options for the conversion of Excel hyperlinks to PDF can be found on the Excel Options Page.
- Only external hyperlinks are converted to PDF links. This is because, in the current implementation, it is impossible (or extremely difficult) to know which page of the generated PDF file will contain the target of an internal link (bookmark).
- Only the following types of hyperlinks in Excel files can be converted to PDF:
 - Absolute URL links (for example, http://www.company.com). You can also use links that specify targets on the page (for example http://idvm001/ibr/portal.htm#target). Note that in order to be processed as an absolute URL link, Excel must return the http://prefix as a part of the link. All supported versions of Microsoft Excel automatically enforce this rule.
 - Relative URL links (for example, ../../../portal.htm). Note that these links do not contain any server name or protocol prefix. The Reader simply attempts to open the file referenced by the link relative to the file you are currently viewing. Office applications often mishandle the relative link address unless a hyperlink base is set (Excel tries to help by converting the address to an absolute path). To work around this, you can set the ExcelSetInfoAndReopen=true variable in the refinery connection's intradoc.cfg file (refinery install dir\connections\<connection name>\intradoc.cfg).
 - Mailto links (links to e-mail addresses; for example mailto:support@company.com). Note that in order to be processed as an e-mail link, Excel must return the mailto: prefix as a part of the link. All supported versions of Microsoft Excel automatically enforce this rule.



Note: The Excel Options panel does not have separate settings for URL links and mailto links. If the *Process Excel URL Links* option is selected, absolute URL links, relative URL links, and mailto links are all converted to PDF.

- Hyperlinks are only converted if they are located in cells. Hyperlinks in text boxes, WordArt objects, and so forth are not converted. In the generated PDF file, the "hotspot" for the link is the cell that contains the link.
- ❖ When using PDF Converter and converting links on multiple pages, links are placed correctly up until there is a page with no links. After that point the links get misplaced. For example, if a workbook prints to nine pages, as long as there is at least one link on every page, all links will be converted correctly. However, if there are no links on page six, links on page seven through nine will be off by one page.
- ❖ The Scaling on the Page Setup for the worksheet must be set to *Adjust to:* ### % normal size (and not "Fit to Page"). Further, the closer to 100% the scale is set, the better your results will be.

CONVERTING MICROSOFT POWERPOINT FILES TO PDF

Consider the following when running PDF Converter on Windows and using Microsoft PowerPoint to convert PowerPoint files to PDF:

- Any information in a PowerPoint file that is outside of the document's print area will not be converted to PDF.
- * Password-protected files will time out unless you enter a password before processing.
- On PowerPoint 2003, make sure that you turn off Show content and links from Microsoft Online on the Tools—Options—General tab under the Online category, and opt out of the Customer Experience Improvement Program on the Tools—Options—General tab under the Customer Feedback category. If you do not, these files might time out.
- Options for the conversion of PowerPoint hyperlinks to PDF can be found on the PowerPoint Options Page.

- PowerPoint has two types of links: *Hyperlinks*, which behave the same in all Office applications, and Action Settings. The MSOfficeConverter.exe supports the following Action Settings: Hyperlink to: Next Slide, Previous Slide, and URL. All other links should be inserted as hyperlinks.
- The following types of hyperlinks in PowerPoint files can be converted to PDF:
 - Absolute URL links (for example, http://www.company.com). You can also use links that specify targets on the page (for example http://idvm001/ibr/portal.htm#target). Note that in order to be processed as an absolute URL link, PowerPoint must return the http://prefix as a part of the link. All supported versions of Microsoft PowerPoint automatically enforce this rule.
 - Relative URL links (for example, ../../../portal.htm). Note that these links do not contain any server name or protocol prefix. The Reader simply attempts to open the file referenced by the link relative to the file you are currently viewing. Office applications often mishandle the relative link address unless a hyperlink base is set (PowerPoint tries to help by converting the address to an absolute path). To work around this, you can set the PowerPointSetInfoAndReopen=true variable in the refinery connection's intradoc.cfg file (refinery install dir\connections\<connection name>\intradoc.cfg).
 - Mailto links (links to e-mail addresses; for example mailto:support@company.com). Note that in order to be processed as an e-mail link, PowerPoint must return the *mailto*: prefix as a part of the link. All supported versions of Microsoft PowerPoint automatically enforce this rule.
 - Bookmarks (internal links to auto-generated or author-generated bookmarks).



Note: The PowerPoint Options panel does not have separate settings for URL links, mailto links, and bookmarks. If the *Process PowerPoint Hyperlinks* option is selected, absolute and relative URL links, mailto links, and bookmarks are all converted to PDF.

UNC path links (for example, \\server1\c\TestDocs\MSOfficeXP\word\target.doc\). This option is not currently available on the PowerPoint Options panel. To enable this functionality, you must set the ProcessPowerPointUncLinks=true variable in the refinery connection's intradoc.cfg file (refinery install dir\connections\<connection name>\intradoc.cfg). In general, UNC paths have no relevance in a web browser; a UNC path is not a URL. Therefore, the PDF *must be opened outside of the web browser* for UNC path links to be resolved correctly. If you are using UNC path links, you might want to configure the Reader on client computers to open PDF files outside the browser.

- ❖ PowerPoint hyperlinks can only be processed if PowerPoint presentations are converted in the Slides format.
- ❖ It is technically possible to have a link on an object (for example, a text box) over a link on an individual line of text. Because of the way the PDF is assembled, only the link on the object will be active in the generated PDF file. Logically, any given spot in a PDF can only be assigned one action; so the "top" action is performed.

CONVERTING MICROSOFT VISIO FILES TO PDF

Consider the following when running PDF Converter on Windows and using Microsoft Visio to convert Visio files to PDF:

- Any information in a Visio file that is outside of the document's print area will not be converted to PDF.
- ❖ Visio files created using the Cross-Functional Flowchart template might cause a popup dialog to appear when Visio attempts to open the file, and thus the refinery process will time out unless this dialog is cleared manually on the refinery computer. To prevent this from happening, do not base files on the Cross-Functional Flowchart template. You can use Outside In to convert Visio files based on the Cross-Functional Flowchart template. However, please note that Visio hyperlinks are not converted by Outside In.
- Password-protected files will time out unless you enter a password before processing.
- ❖ On Visio 2003, make sure that you turn off Show content and links from Microsoft Online on the Tools—Options—General tab under the Online category, and opt out of the Customer Experience Improvement Program on the Tools—Options—General tab under the Customer Feedback category. If you do not, these files might time out.
- Options for the conversion of Visio hyperlinks to PDF can be found on the Visio Options Page.
- The following types of hyperlinks in Visio files can be converted to PDF:
 - Absolute URL links (for example, http://www.company.com). You can also use links that specify targets on the page (for example http://idvm001/ibr/portal.htm#target). Visio does not enforce some of the hyperlink rules that are enforced by other Office applications. Therefore, the author of the Visio document must use the http://prefix as a part of the link. If the prefix is not found, the link will be converted as a relative URL link; this will

- likely not produce the link in the PDF as desired. Without the author applying this prefix, there is no way for the conversion engine to distinguish the link from relative and mailto links.
- Relative URL links (for example, ../../../portal.htm). Note that these links do not contain any server name or protocol prefix. The Reader simply attempts to open the file referenced by the link relative to the file you are currently viewing. Visio only provides limited support for relative URL links; this is because Visio itself does not store hyperlinks as well as other Office applications. Visio fails to return the correct address to the conversion engine; this is not a flaw in the conversion engine. For example, a relative hyperlink ../../../portal.htm will convert successfully. However, a relative link to mytestPage.asp?param1=123?param2=abc will not be returned to the conversion engine correctly.
- Mailto links (links to e-mail addresses; for example mailto:support@company.com). Visio does not enforce some of the hyperlink rules that are enforced by other Office applications. Therefore, the author of the Visio document must use the mailto: prefix as a part of the link. If the prefix is not found, the link will be converted as a relative URL link; this will likely not produce the link in the PDF as desired. Without the author applying this prefix, there is no way for the conversion engine to distinguish the link from absolute and relative links.
- Bookmarks (internal links to auto-generated or author-generated bookmarks). When *Process internal Visio links* is selected on the Visio Options panel, all internal document links to other sheets are included in the generated PDF.



Important: For proper conversion of internal hyperlinks in Visio 2003, you must clear the address field when creating the hyperlink. By default, the address field is populated with the file name of the file in which the link occurs. If this is not cleared, the link is converted as a link to the original file and prompts the user to download the original file when the link is clicked.

• UNC path links (for example, \\\server1\c\TestDocs\MSOfficeXP\\word\\target.doc\). This option is not currently available on the Visio Options panel. To enable this functionality, you must set the ProcessVisioUncLinks=true variable in the refinery connection's intradoc.cfg file (refinery_install_dir\connections\<connection_name>\intradoc.cfg\). In general, UNC paths have no relevance in a web browser; a UNC path is not a URL. Therefore, the PDF must be opened outside of the web browser for UNC path links to be resolved correctly. If you are using UNC path links, you might

want to configure the Reader on client computers to open PDF files outside the browser.

- ❖ All Microsoft Visio files should be set up so that the printer paper size and orientation matches the drawing page size and orientation. Otherwise, links will not be converted correctly (they will be placed in the wrong location). For example, if the printer paper is set to Letter/Landscape, the drawing page should also be set to Letter/Landscape.
- ❖ In the generated PDF file, the "hotspot" for a Visio hyperlink is a square that encompasses the shape; even if the shape itself is not a square.

USING RELATIVE VERSUS ABSOLUTE LINKS IN OFFICE DOCUMENTS

Both relative and absolute hyperlinks can be converted to PDF in Word, Excel, PowerPoint, and Visio files.

Example absolute link:

http://machine/ucm/groups/public/documents/addacct/000123.pdf

Example relative link:

 $.. \\ addacct \\ \ 000123.pdf$

When creating links, absolute and relative links each have advantages and disadvantages. Absolute links are easy to copy and paste, however, relative links can eliminate issues if the content server is migrated to a new machine or if the IP address and DNS names change; relative links will always be relative to the location of the web viewable file for the document you are checking in.

To use relative links in Word, Excel, PowerPoint, and Visio documents, complete the following steps:



Important: This procedure applies to PDF Converter with Microsoft Office installed, using the *Convert to PDF using third-party applications* option. This procedure does not apply to configurations using PDF Converter on UNIX or configurations using Inbound Refinery without PDF Converter.

- 1. Log into the refinery.
- 2. Select Conversion Settings—Third-Party Application Settings. The Third-Party Application Settings page is displayed.

- 3. Click the **Options** button for the third-party application. The corresponding options page is displayed.
- 4. Select the option to support relative URL links:
 - Word Options Page—Support Relative URL Links check box
 - Excel Options Page—Support Relative URL Links and Reselect Worksheet Cell check box
 - PowerPoint Options Page—Support Relative URL Links check box
 - Visio Options Page—Process Visio URL links check box
- 5. Click **Update** to save your changes.
- 6. Use relative links, instead of absolute links, when authoring documents. It is important to understand that these links will be relative to the location of the web viewable file for the document you are checking in:

Example 1: Relative linking with the same document type and security

Let's say you wanted to create a link to document 000123. If the document was checked into security group "public" and document type "adacct", this document has a web viewable URL of:

http://machine/ucm/groups/public/documents/adacct/000123.pdf

Now if you check document 000456 into the same security group and document type, its web viewable URL would be:

http://machine/ucm/groups/public/documents/adacct/000456.pdf

Since the URL path is identical to 000123, your relative URL link in the document for 000456 would only need to be:

000123.pdf

Example 2: Relative linking to a different document type

Using the same document names, if you checked document 000456 into the same security group but a different document type, its web viewable URL would look like:

http://machine/ucm/groups/public/documents/adcorp/000456.pdf

This means that your relative URL link needs to go up one directory and then into "adacct" to find 000123.pdf. So the relative URL link would be:

..\adacct\000123.pdf

Example 3: Relative linking to a different document security

Now if you also change the security group of document 000456, its web viewable URL would look like:

http://machine/ucm/groups/secure/documents/adcorp/000456.pdf

This means that the relative URL link will need to go up three directories and then back down to 000123.pdf. So the relative URL link would be:

- ..\..\public\adacct\000123.pdf
- 7. Check the documents into the content server. When converting the documents to PDF, the refinery will create links relative to the location of the web viewable file for each document you are checking in.

UPDATING THE MSOFFICECONVERTER.EXE

The *MSOfficeConverter.exe* executable file is the element of PDF Converter that controls the conversion of Microsoft Office documents to PostScript files. This file is located in the <*refinery_install_dir>\custom\PDFConverter\bin\win32* directory. The *MSOfficeConverter.exe* file is sometimes updated to address conversion issues with Microsoft Office files. To update the *MSOfficeConverter.exe* to a newer version, complete the following steps:

- 1. To check the version of the *MSOfficeConverter.exe* you have installed, locate the file in Windows Explorer and choose Properties from the right-click pop-up menu. Version information is available on the version tab.
- 2. Obtain the current MSOfficeConverter.exe file from support.
- 3. Open the patch zip archive and locate the MSOfficeConverter.exe file.
- 4. Stop the refinery.
- 5. On the Refinery computer, navigate to the <*refinery_install_dir*>\custom\PDFConverter\bin\win32\ directory and rename the existing MSOfficeConverter.exe file to a different name to create a backup file (for example, MSOfficeConverterOLD.exe).
- 6. Place a copy of the new MSOfficeConverter.exe file into the <refinery install dir>\custom\PDFConverter\bin\win32\\ directory.
- 7. Restart the refinery. You do not need to restart the content server for this change to take effect.

TROUBLESHOOTING PROCESS FOR PDF CONVERSION ISSUES

The vast majority of PDF conversion issues fall into one of the following categories:

- ❖ When a file is checked into the content server, a PDF is not generated.
- ❖ A PDF is generated, but there are problems with the output.

When troubleshooting PDF conversion issues, you should first try to identify if the issue is related to just one specific file, all files of that type, or all files. For example, if you are having problems converting a Microsoft Excel document to PDF, try checking in other Microsoft Excel documents; preferably files that are smaller and less complex. If the problem is specific to a single file, the problem is most likely related to something within the file itself, such as file corruption, file setup and formatting, and so forth.

If a PDF is not generated when a file is checked into the content server, complete the following basic troubleshooting steps:

- 1. Look at the Inbound Refinery and agent logs and identify which step of the conversion process failed (printing to PostScript, PostScript to PDF conversion, etc.). For more information about viewing Inbound Refinery and agent logs and enabling verbose logging for agents, refer to the *Inbound Refinery Administration Guide*.
- 2. If the file is timing out during conversion, first try checking in another, smaller, less complex file of the same type. If multiple files are timing out, adjust your timeout values and re-submit the files for conversion. For more information about configuring timeout values, refer to the *Inbound Refinery Administration Guide*.
- 3. If the file is failing to print to PostScript, try printing the file to PostScript manually. Most failure to print to PostScript issues are related to the following possible causes:
 - The IDC PDF Converter printer is not installed.
 - The IDC PDF Converter printer is not named or set up properly.

For more information about installing and configuring the IDC PDF Converter printer, see Installing the IDC PDF Converter Printer (page 4-10).

4. If the file is printing to PostScript successfully but failing to convert to PDF, again first try checking in another, smaller, less complex file of the same type. If the problem is not specific to a single file, or you cannot identify a problem within the files that is causing the conversion to fail, the problem is most likely related to the distiller engine that you are using. For more information about installing and configuring a distiller engine, see Installing a Distiller Engine (page 4-7).

If a PDF is generated but there are problems with the output (bad hyperlinks, problems with fonts or graphics, etc.), the following possible causes are common:

- ❖ If the file is a Microsoft Office document, the most current Microsoft Office Conversion Engine is not being used. For more information, see Updating the MSOfficeConverter.exe (page 6-12).
- ❖ If the file is a Microsoft Office document, Microsoft Office 97 is being used. For more information, see Chapter 6 (*Converting Microsoft Office Files to PDF*).

COMMON CONVERSION ISSUES

Content items are often converted incorrectly, or not at all, for the following reasons:

- ❖ Information within the document is outside of the document's print area—

 Depending on the native application used to create the document and how your system is set up, a document is sometimes printed to a PostScript file, and the PostScript file is then converted to PDF. Therefore, any information in the document that is outside of the document's print area will not be included in the generated PDF.
- ❖ PDF Converter is trying to convert a file that is not appropriate for the conversion engine—For example, if a file from an application other than Microsoft Word has the extension *doc*, the document is opened in Microsoft Word, which is not correct. The conversion will then fail.
- The third-party application that is used for conversion starts up with items that require user interaction, such as startup dialogs, tip wizards, or update notices—This prevents PDF Converter from processing and converting the files correctly, and the conversion will time out. Always make sure that you turn off all such features before using a third-party application for conversion purposes.
- ❖ The Inbound Refinery's Java Virtual Machine (JVM) is frozen—This is usually associated with failed attempts to convert invalid file formats. Restarting Inbound Refinery will usually fix this problem.
- ❖ PDF Converter did not have enough time to process the file—You can detect this by filtering for the conversion status *PassThru* in Repository Manager. You can also look at the Inbound Refinery and agent log files. Prevent future occurrences of this problem by increasing the appropriate conversion factor on the Timeout Settings page in the Inbound Refinery administration interface.

- ❖ The content item was converted correctly but you cannot view the generated PDF file in Adobe Acrobat or Acrobat Reader. You might be using an old Acrobat version. In order to ensure that you can view all generated PDF files correctly, you should always use the latest version of Adobe Acrobat or Adobe Acrobat Reader. For details, see Installing a PDF Reader Plugin on Client Computers (page 4-19).
- ❖ A Microsoft Office file and a hyperlink within that file does not convert correctly. It is possible that the hyperlink is not formatted correctly or is not supported by PDF Converter. For details, see Chapter 6 (Converting Microsoft Office Files to PDF).

PDF Converter Installation Issues

The following are symptoms of PDF Converter installation issues:

❖ Printer Installation Error: 'Can't run 16-bit Windows program' (page 7-4)

Printer Installation Error: 'Can't run 16-bit Windows program'

When installing the IDC PDF Converter printer, the installer fails. A dialog box is displayed labeled "Can't run 16-bit Windows program," containing an error message similar to the following:

Cannot find file C:\DOCUME~1\ADMINI~1\LOCALS~1\Temp\pft9D~tmp\ Setup.exe (or one of its components). Check to ensure the path and filename are correct and that all required libraries are available.



Tech Tip: This symptom applies to other 16-bit install programs, such as some versions of the SUN JAVA Virtual Machine.

Possible Causes	Solutions
The install program is a 16-bit program and requires 8.3 file system support. When installing Inbound Refinery you chose to disable 8.3 file system support. Thus, 16-bit programs can no longer find folders and files that contain spaces or special characters and are greater than 8 characters.	Enable 8.3 system support on the Inbound Refinery computer. For details, see Enabling 8.3 System Support below. Additional information can be found in the various Microsoft resources available to the public. 8.3-compliant file and folder names are listed in the Microsoft Knowledgebase article Q100108 under FAT Naming Convention.

Enabling 8.3 System Support

To enable 8.3 system support, complete the following steps:

- 1. On the Inbound Refinery computer, change the temp and tmp System Environment variables to a newly-created folder that conforms to the 8.3 naming convention (for example, *C:\Temp*). The 16-bit program file must also be run from a folder that complies with the 8.3 limitations. These limitations are listed in the Microsoft Knowledgebase article Q100108 under FAT Naming Convention.
- 2. In the Windows Start menu, choose **Run**.
- 3. Type *regedit* and click **OK**.
- 4. In the registry editor, navigate to the *HKEY_LOCAL_MACHINE\SYSTEM\ CurrentControlSet\Control\File System* directory.
- 5. Right-click on NtfsDisable8dot3NameCreation and select Modify.
- 6. Change the NtfsDisable8dot3NameCreation value from 1 to 0 (Base Hexadecimal).
- 7. Click **OK**.
- 8. Restart the Inbound Refinery computer.

PDF CONVERTER SETUP AND RUN ISSUES

The following are symptoms of PDF Converter setup and run issues:

- ❖ PDF Converter Won't Process Any Files (page 7-6)
- **❖** Missing IDC PDF Printer (page 7-7)
- Error: 'Unable to convert. The printer 'IDC PDF Converter' is not installed' (page 7-7)
- Error: 'Unable to convert. The printer 'IDC PDF Converter' is not printing to 'c:/temp/idcoutput.ps'.' (page 7-8)
- Conversions Keep Timing Out (page 7-8)
- ❖ Microsoft Word Files Won't Convert (page 7-9)
- ❖ Microsoft Excel Files Won't Convert (page 7-10)
- ❖ Microsoft PowerPoint Files Won't Convert (page 7-11)
- ❖ Microsoft Visio Files Won't Convert (page 7-12)
- ❖ FrameMaker Files Won't Convert (page 7-12)
- ❖ WordPerfect Files Won't Convert (page 7-13)

PDF Converter Won't Process Any Files

PDF Converter has been installed, but no files are being converted.

Possible Causes	Solutions
File formats and conversion methods not set up for file type in the content server.	Use the File Formats Wizard or Configuration Manager in the content server to set up the file formats and conversion methods for PDF conversion. For more information, refer to the <i>Inbound Refinery Administration Guide</i> .

Missing IDC PDF Printer

The IDC PDF Printer is missing from the list of local printers and documents are stuck in GENWWW. Rebooting the server did not resolve the issue.

Possible Causes	Solutions
The "Print Spooler" service might not be running.	This service ensures that all installed printers are available, including the IDC PDF Printer. Check in the Windows services console (accessible under Control Panel—Administrative Tools—Services) to make sure this service is running and set to start automatically. If the service is not running, the PDF Converter will not be able to locate and use the IDC PDF Printer and documents will be stuck in GENWWW. With the startup type of the "Printer Spooler" service set to "Automatic," this service will start every time the computer boots. After starting the "Print Spooler" service, you can use Repository Manager to resubmit the documents stuck in GENWWW. Assuming that there are no other conversion issues, the system should now be able to convert documents to PDF successfully.

Error: 'Unable to convert. The printer 'IDC PDF Converter' is not installed'

PDF Converter is not converting any files to PDF, and the following error message appears in the Inbound Refinery log:

Unable to convert. The printer 'IDC PDF Converter' is not installed.

Possible Causes	Solutions
The IDC PDF Converter printer is not installed.	Install the IDC PDF Converter printer. For details, see Installing the IDC PDF Converter Printer (page 4-10).

Error: 'Unable to convert. The printer 'IDC PDF Converter' is not printing to 'c:/temp/idcoutput.ps'.'

PDF Converter is not converting any files to PDF, and the following error appears in the Inbound Refinery log:

Step MSOfficeToPostscript forced conversion failure passthru by conversion engine with error: "Unable to convert. The printer 'IDC PDF Converter' is not printing to 'c:/temp/idcoutput.ps'."

Possible Causes	Solutions
The IDC PDF Converter printer is not printing to the correct port.	Make sure the IDC PDF Converter printer is set to print to the correct port. The default port is c:\temp\idcoutput.ps. For details, see Installing the IDC PDF Converter Printer (page 4-10). The default port can be changed by adding the PrinterPortPath variable to the intradoc.cfg file located in the <refinery_install_dir>\bin\ directory and specifying the port path. In this case, the IDC PDF Converter printer should be set to print to the port specified in the intradoc.cfg file.</refinery_install_dir>

Conversions Keep Timing Out

PDF Converter conversions keep timing out.

Possible Causes	Solutions
Files are password protected.	Password-protected files will bring up a dialog window during conversion, which will cause the conversion to time out if the dialog is not cleared manually. Remove password protection from files before checking them in.
Your timeout settings are not sufficient.	Adjust your timeout settings. For more information about configuring timeout values, refer to the <i>Inbound Refinery Administration Guide</i> .

Microsoft Word Files Won't Convert

Microsoft Word files fail to convert.

PDF Files Don't Open Within Browser Window

Problems Printing PDFs Using Adobe Acrobat Reader 6.0

When you try to print a PDF, the document will not print and the following message is displayed: *Could not start print job*.

Possible Causes	Solutions
You have Adobe Acrobat Reader 6.0 installed. Adobe Acrobat Reader 6.0 is unable to print a PDF when a filename and URL has more than 256 characters. URLs in workflow and subscription email notifications can easily exceed 256 characters.	Adobe has fixed this problem in Adobe Acrobat Reader 6.0.1. Download and install Adobe Acrobat Reader 6.0.1 or higher to solve this problem.

Internal Thumbnails Not Displayed Properly When Viewing PDF Files Using Adobe Acrobat Reader

When you view a PDF file, internal thumbnails (thumbnails of the pages within the PDF file) do not display properly. They might display with poor quality, display as grey rectangles, or not display at all.

Possible Causes	Solutions
You are using Adobe Acrobat Reader 5 or 6, and the PDF file is being byte served	Use Acrobat Reader 7 or higher. This issue appears to be fixed in Acrobat Reader 7.

If the thumbnail is being generated in Acrobat Reader dynamically, the PDF is being byte served from the web server, and the internal thumbnails are not embedded in the PDF, certain versions of Reader might not be able to render the internal thumbnails properly. This is because the full image data for a given page is on the web server and not available on the client to render the thumbnail image. It is also possible that certain versions of Acrobat Reader might not display internal thumbnails for any PDF that are byte	Disable byte serving of PDF files on the web server.

FILE FORMATS CONVERTED TO PDF USING THIRD-PARTY APPLICATIONS

- ❖ The third-party applications used during the conversion. For details, see Installing Third-Party Applications for PDF Conversion (page 4-12).

The following table lists the common file formats that can be converted to PDF using third-party applications on Windows. Please note the following important considerations:

- Third-party applications used in conversions, a PostScript distiller engine, and a PostScript printer are not provided with PDF Converter. You must obtain all third-party applications required for the conversions you want to perform, as well as a PostScript distiller engine and a PostScript printer of your choice.
- ❖ All third-party applications necessary to convert a file must be installed on the PDF Converter computer.
- ❖ Only the listed common file formats are supported for conversion. Conversion of additional file formats might be possible, however, the results cannot be guaranteed.
- Only the listed versions of each third-party application are supported for use with PDF Converter. Conversion using other versions of the third-party applications might be possible, however, the results cannot be guaranteed.
- ❖ Only conversion of listed file formats using the listed third-party applications is supported. Conversion of some file formats using an alternate third-party application might be possible (for example, conversion of Corel WordPerfect files using Microsoft Word), however, the results cannot be guaranteed.
- Non-English files can be converted by PDF Converter on Win32 operating systems as long as the language is supported by the 3rd-party application and the 3rd-party application is installed and configured on an English operating system to open and display the non-English file properly. For example, PDF Converter can convert German Microsoft Word files as long as Microsoft Word is installed on a supported operating system and Microsoft Word is configured with the necessary files to open and display German Word files properly. Other third-party application/operating system language combinations are possible, however, the results of these conversions cannot be guaranteed.
- ❖ All listed file formats are supported for conversion to PDF, however, Outside In Image Export cannot create thumbnails from all of these native file formats. If you want to ensure that thumbnails will be created for all file formats, clear the *Create Thumbnail Image from the Native Vault File* check box on the Inbound Refinery Thumbnail Options screen.
